



Electoral Transparency: The results announced by the NEC are not credible

Electoral Transparency monitored Venezuela's electoral day both nationally and in four cities abroad, with a team of dozens of people and two situation rooms located in Miami and Buenos Aires.

The pre-electoral phase was marked by obstacles to the participation of 5 million Venezuelans abroad, illegal disqualifications (including that of María Corina Machado), judicial intervention in political parties, and more than 100 arbitrary arrests in the context of the elections.

In addition to this are the events of July 28: prevention of opposition witnesses from entering polling stations, "red points" (puntos rojos) near venues to control participation, voter transport, use of state resources to benefit the ruling party, and lack of willingness to allow witnesses and the public to observe the closing of tables and the citizen audit.

On Sunday night, the National Electoral Council announced, through its President Elvis Amoroso, that Nicolás Maduro had obtained 51.20% of the votes (5,150,092), while opposition candidate Edmundo González received 44.20% of the votes (4,445,978).

Amoroso claimed that the trend was irreversible, although by the time of the announcement more than 2 million votes remained to be counted (three times the difference between the candidates). The CNE did not publish the scrutiny records to support the announced result.



The Democratic Unity Platform (PUD) and Edmundo González's Campaign Command made an extraordinary effort to digitize and make available more than 81% of the records nationwide (as of Wednesday). With that totalized percentage, Edmundo González has 7,119,768 votes (67%), while Maduro obtains 3,225,819 votes (30%).

Electoral Transparency collaborators in Venezuela verified the proper functioning of the Democratic Unity Platform (PUD) coalition's platform and have accessed some of the scrutiny records.

More than 48 hours after the polling stations closed, the NEC has not only failed to publish results but has already declared Maduro president-elect.

Meanwhile, the Carter Center, the only international organization accredited to the CNE to observe the elections, stated on Wednesday that the elections did not meet international integrity standards and cannot be considered democratic.

In this scenario, it is essential that the international community urge the National Electoral Council to immediately publish all scrutiny records and submit them to forensic analysis to verify their authenticity.
